

**Documents, Sought for Cat and Dog Species Which are Not Restricted / Banned and Which are Acceptable
for Transport, and Requirements to Transport Them**

About health certificates

Available under Section 2 of the health certificate (Description of the Pet)

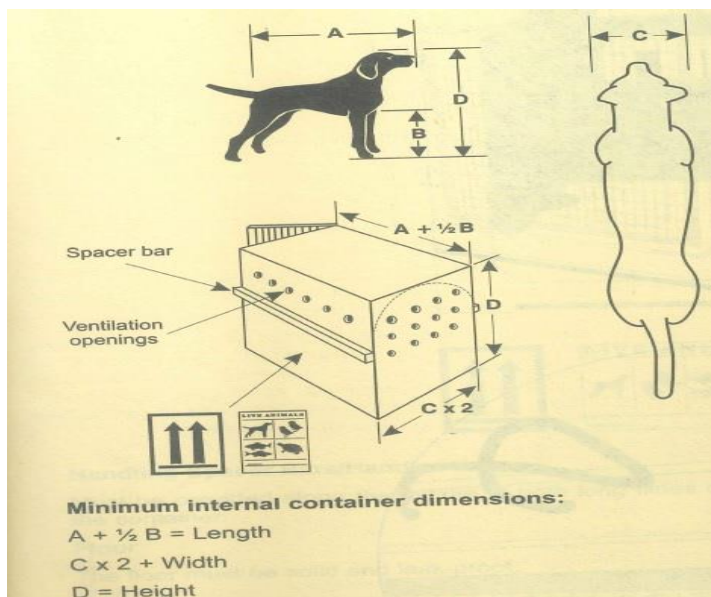
- Species, breed, date of birth and color
- Stamp and signature of the veterinarian

Available under Section 9 of the health certificate (Clinical Examination)

- The expression, which reads as “**This pet is fit for travel**”, should be approved by the veterinarian, who has examined the pet, by affixing the date of examination, as well as her/his stamp and signature.

About pet carriers

- Rigid plastic cage
- There must be ventilating openings on all of the 4 sides of the cage
- The cage must have handles
- The cage must be undamaged
- The cage must have a sufficient amount of absorbent materials
- The cage should bear the full name, address and contact number of the consignee thereon.
- The minimum width sizes of the cage must be as shown on the table below.



- $C \times 3$ in case of 2 pets in a cage

- C x 4 in case of 3 pets in a cage
- Up to three non-6 month old infants born to a mother more than 6 months old can be transported in the same cage.
- In the cargo compartment, the same race animals with a total weight of up to 14 kg, close to each other and used to living together can be transported in a single cage. If the animal weight is more than 14 kg, it can be transported as a single.

The live animals should not have received any sedative or injection to be tranquillized, otherwise they shall not be admitted to the flight.

Before bringing any live animal to the airport, you should dial 0212 463 63 63 / 20454 – 20606 – 20605 - 20458 – 20456 - 20460 to contact with the Domestic Cargo Department, and receive a confirmation from the department that live animals are admitted to the flight.
